A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROHNERT PARK AUTHORIZING AND ACCEPTING THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA OFFICE OF TRAFFIC SAFETY (OTS) SELECTIVE TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM (STEP) GRANT AND AMENDING THE FY 2014-2015 OPERATING AND REVENUE BUDGETS

WHEREAS, the Rohnert Park Department of Public Safety has conducted numerous enforcement programs to ensure compliance with vehicle laws;

WHEREAS, the Public Safety Department has been awarded a State of California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) grant for total award of \$120,000,(\$63,020 under Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) Number 20.616 and \$56,980.00 under CFDA number 20.600) (hereinafter "OTS STEP Grant");

WHEREAS, the OTS STEP Grant has been awarded to fund the Rohnert Park Department of Public Safety's focused and increased enforcement to reduce the number of persons injured and killed in traffic collisions beginning October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015; and,

WHEREAS, the the Public Safety Department seeks Council authority to accept the OTS STEP Grant and create an additional program budget.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Rohnert Park does hereby authorize and accept the OTS STEP Grant Agreement attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference, and further authorizes the Director of Finance, or his/her designee, to increase appropriations in the amount of \$120,000 in account 001-P209-400, and to make any other accounting adjustments necessary to execute the OTS STEP Grant in accordance with GAAP and applicable laws.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Manager is hereby authorized and directed to take all actions to implement this OTS STEP Grant for and on behalf of the City of Rohnert Park.

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1. PROBLEM STATEMENT

The City of Rohnert Park is a residential community located in the southern central portion of Sonoma County. Hwy 101 splits the city into two sections primarily comprised of commercial to the west and residential to the east. Based on the location of Rohnert Park in Sonoma County, tourists frequently drive through the community after spending a day or weekend in the wine country - this alone increases the City's DUI potential.

Currently the daytime population is 43,000 people; however, the city is home to Sonoma State University which brings an additional 11,000 students each year to the community. In addition to the university, Rohnert Park recently opened The Green Music Center which hosts world renowned musicians and performers. The seating capacity of the center is 2,000 people. All of the Music Center's patrons have the ability to dine in an upscale restaurant which is located on site of the concert hall. The Graton Rancheria also opened the largest Indian Resort and Casino in California in Rohnert Park on November 5, 2013. The resort is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. It was projected that the casino would create an increase in traffic to the area, not to mention the increase in impaired drivers. Three of the four access points to the casino traverse though the City of Rohnert Park, which has in fact seen an increase in both traffic collisions as well as impaired drivers since the opening of the casino.

Currently traffic collisions, as well as injuries, in Rohnert Park are on the rise. The 2011 ranking for impaired drivers under 21 is 5. In 10 of the OTS collision categories, the City of Rohnert Park is below average in six categories. Although the composite ranking by population is 70, this number is not a real reflection of the people in our community based on the seasonal increases. A better reflection is the ranking by daily miles travelled; wherein, our ranking is 46. This is below the average for comparable cities in our group. The department investigated three fatal collisions within three months in 2013 (it had been two years since the previous fatality). Although the department is working diligently to decrease injury collisions as well as impaired drivers, the traffic volume is increasing and putting a strain on the public safety force.

In 2008 the Department of Public Safety had 80 sworn officers to assist in combating the traffic issues in the community. Today, the City has twice the development and only 55 sworn officers. Like most agencies, the Department of Public Safety has to do more with less. Because part one crimes were and are a priority, traffic became an ancillary assignment until 2011. Since 2011, the Department of Public Safety has increased targeted traffic enforcement as well as DUI checkpoint and saturation details with the assistance of OTS. The agency has relied on the funding opportunities to do targeted enforcement solely because the time was not available for the officers on a regular shift. The overtime opportunities have ensured directed enforcement.

2. Performance Measures

A. Goals:

- 1) To reduce the number of persons killed in traffic collisions.
- 2) To reduce the number of persons injured in traffic collisions.
- 3) To reduce the number of persons killed in alcohol-involved collisions.

B. Objectives:

- 1) To develop (by December 31) and/or maintain a "HOT Sheet" program to notify patrol and traffic officers to be on the lookout for identified repeat DUI offenders with a suspended or revoked license as a result of DUI convictions. Updated HOT sheets should be distributed to patrol and traffic officers monthly.
- 2) To send 4 law enforcement personnel to the NHTSA Standardized Field Sobriety Testing (SFST) (minimum 16 hour) POST-certified training.
- 3) To send 2 law enforcement personnel to the NHTSA Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE) 16 hour POST-certified training.
- 4) To send 1 law enforcement personnel to the IACP Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) training.
- 5) To conduct 4 DUI/DL Checkpoints. Note: A minimum of 1 checkpoint should be conducted during the NHTSA Winter Mobilization and 1 during the NHTSA Summer Mobilization.
- 6) To conduct 12 DUI Saturation Patrol operation(s).
- 7) To conduct 1 Warrant Service operation(s) targeting DUI offenders who fail to appear in court.
- 8) To conduct 16 Traffic Enforcement operation(s), including but not limited to, primary collision factor violations.
- 9) To conduct 12 Distracted Driving enforcement operation(s) targeting drivers using hand held cell phones and texting.
- 10) To conduct 5 night-time (2100 0259 hours) Click It or Ticket enforcement operations.
- 11) To conduct 16 bicycle and pedestrian enforcement operations in identified areas of high bicycle and pedestrian traffic.

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- 12) To participate in the National Distracted Driving Awareness Month in April.
- 13) To participate in the NHTSA Click It or Ticket mobilization period in May,
- 14) To collaborate with the county's Avoid Lead Agency by: participating in planning/scheduling meetings and MADD/Avoid DUI Seminars; providing your agency's schedule of operations that occur during any Avoid campaign; and reporting your agency's DUI arrests & DUI fatality information during any Avoid campaign.
- 15) To collect and report DUI enforcement data for the NHTSA Winter and Summer Mobilizations.

NOTE: Nothing in this "agreement" shall be interpreted as a requirement, formal or informal, that a particular police officer issue a specified or predetermined number of citations in pursuance of the goals and objectives hereunder.

NOTE: To enhance the overall deterrent effect and promote high visibility, it is recommended the grantee issue an advance press release for each checkpoint operation. For combination DUI/DL checkpoints, departments should issue press releases that mention DL's will be checked at the DUI/DL checkpoint. Signs for DUI/DL checkpoint operations should read "DUI/Driver's License Checkpoint Ahead." OTS does not fund or support independent DL checkpoints. Only on an exception basis and with OTS pre-approval will OTS fund checkpoint operations that begin prior to 1800 hours.

3. METHOD OF PROCEDURE

A. Phase 1 - Program Preparation, Training and Implementation (1st Quarter of Grant Year)

- The police department will develop operational plans to implement the "best practice" strategies outlined in the objectives section.
- All training needed to implement the program should be conducted this quarter.
- All grant related purchases needed to implement the program should be made this quarter.
- In order to develop/maintain the "Hot Sheets," research will be conducted to identify the "worst of the worst" repeat DUI offenders with a suspended or revoked license as a result of DUI convictions. The Hot Sheets may include the driver's name, last known address, DOB, description, current license status, and the number of times suspended or revoked for DUI. Hot Sheets should be updated and distributed to traffic and patrol officers at least monthly.
- Implementation of the STEP grant activities will be accomplished by deploying personnel at high collision locations.

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Media Requirements

• Issue a press release announcing the kick-off of the grant by November 15. The kick-off press releases and media advisories, alerts, and materials must be emailed to the OTS Public Information Officer at pio@ots.ca.gov, and copied to your OTS Coordinator, for approval 14 days prior to the issuance date of the release.

B. Phase 2 - Program Operations (Throughout Grant Year)

The police department will work to create media opportunities throughout the grant period to call attention to the innovative program strategies and outcomes.

Media Requirements

- Send all grant-related activity press releases, media advisories, alerts and general public materials to the OTS Public Information Officer (PIO) at pio@ots.ca.gov, with a copy to your OTS Coordinator.
 - a) If an OTS template-based press release is used, the OTS PIO and Coordinator should be copied when the release is distributed to the press. If an OTS template is not used, or is substantially changed, a draft press release should first be sent to the OTS PIO for approval. Optimum lead time would be 10-20 days prior to the release date to ensure adequate turn-around time.
 - b) Press releases reporting the results of grant activities such as enforcement operations are exempt from the recommended advance approval process, but still should be copied to the OTS PIO and Coordinator when the release is distributed to the press.
 - c) Activities such as warrant or probation sweeps and court stings that could be compromised by advanced publicity are exempt from pre-publicity, but are encouraged to offer embargoed media coverage and to report the results.
- Use the following standard language in all press, media, and printed materials: Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
- Email the OTS PIO at <u>pio@ots.ca.gov</u> and copy your OTS Coordinator at least 30 days in advance, a short description of any significant grant-related traffic safety event or program so OTS has sufficient notice to arrange for attendance and/or participation in the event.
- Submit a draft or rough-cut of all printed or recorded material (brochures, posters, scripts, artwork, trailer graphics, etc.) to the OTS PIO at <u>pio@ots.ca.gov</u> and copy your OTS Coordinator for approval 14 days prior to the production or duplication.

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• Include the OTS logo, space permitting, on grant-funded print materials; consult your OTS Coordinator for specifics.

C. Phase 3 - Data Collection & Reporting (Throughout Grant Year)

- Agencies are required to collect and report quarterly, appropriate data that supports the progress of goals and objectives.
- Statistical data relating to the grant goals and objectives will be collected, analyzed, and incorporated in Quarterly Performance Reports (QPRs). QPRs for the quarter ending September 30 will include year-to-date comparisons of goals and objectives. If required, a separate quarterly data reporting form will be completed each quarter and submitted as part of the QPR.
